Victorian Hats

Background:

Circuses were a very popular form of entertainment during the Victorian era. A ringmaster or ringmistress, or sometimes a ringleader, is a master of ceremonies that introduces the circus acts to the audience. The traditional ringmaster costume consists of a bright tailcoat, often red with gold trim and with a waistcoat and a black top hat.

Supplies:

- Paper plate
- Two pieces of paper (a thicker paper like construction paper works best)
- Glue
- Tape
- Paint (or crayons/markers/color pencils)
- Decorative items: buttons, sequins, ribbons, feathers, faux flowers, beads, etc.

Directions:

- 1. Cut out a hole in the middle of the paper plate to fit your head, this is the brim of your hat.
- 2. Tape two pieces of paper together, end to end, to make a longer piece of paper.
- 3. Roll the paper into a cylinder. Make the cylinder wide enough to snugly fit inside the hole in the brim.
- 4. Snip tabs into one end of the cylinder, about 2 inches deep
- 5. Fit the tabbed end of the cylinder through the hole in the paper plate. Bend the tabs back and tape it to the underside of the plate.
- 6. Color your hat.
- 7. Decorate using any craft items you have at hand.
