

During the 1950s, there was an epidemic of <u>polio</u>, a disease that mainly affected children. It was very <u>contagious</u> and some children who became sick with it lost the ability to <u>walk</u>. People were very worried, because 58,000 <u>cases</u> of polio were reported in 1952. This was almost three times as many as normal. Parents wanted a cure or a <u>vaccine</u> to protect their children.


Scientists had been researching polio vaccines, but during the 1950s, millions of dollars were invested by the government and private companies to find a cure. In 1955, Jonas Salk's polio vaccine was available to the public.

Parents lined up around the block to make sure their children were protected. By 1961, only 161 cases of polio were reported in the US.

Locally, Dr. Harold D. Chope was the director of San Mateo County Community Hospital. It was the only <u>hospital</u> that accepted polio patients. There were often as many as 50 patients, mostly children, in the hospital. Once the vaccine became available, Dr. Chope organized its distribution throughout San Mateo County, eradicating the disease locally. He was honored in 2005, as the "Physician of the Century" for all his work looking after the <u>health</u> of the people of San Mateo County.

County Growth

In the 1950s, many people moved to San Mateo County. There hadn't been so many towns incorporated since the 1920s. When a town incorporates it has its own government and services.

Industry

Bill Eitel and Jack McCullough founded <u>Eimac</u> in San Bruno in 1934. The <u>company</u> moved to San Carlos for more space in 1959. In May of that year, they produced a new giant <u>klystron</u> tube that powered MIT's radar.

Alexander Poniatoff started

Ampex during World War II and moved the company to Redwood City in the 1950s. The company pre-recorded singer and actor Bing Crosby's radio shows. In 1954, an Ampex tape recorder recorded the first Elvis Presley single, "That's All Right." In 1956, the company invented the first video tape recorder and won an Emmy for it the next year. In 1958, NASA started using Ampex data recorders and magnetic tape.

At its Menlo Park location, <u>Hiller</u>
Aviation housed advanced
research for the Lockheed
Corporation. In 1950, it produced
its first military <u>helicopter</u> that
was used in the <u>Korean</u> War.


Paul Cook founded <u>Raychem</u> in Redwood City in 1957. It worked in <u>radiation</u> chemistry, a new branch of <u>science</u>. Its first product was <u>lightweight</u>, rugged <u>wire</u> and cable for aircraft.






The 1950s saw the creation of large shopping centers that people drove to. David <u>Bohannon</u> built a new shopping <u>district</u> in San Mateo.

Hillsdale Shopping Center looked different when it opened in 1954. There were twelve buildings surrounding a central courtyard. These shops included restaurants, department stores, and a farmer's market. It had the first suburban Macy's in California that was larger than any other store in the county.

Hillsdale Shopping Center was at the end of the "main drag" down El Camino Real. Teens flocked to the food <u>court</u> and popular restaurants like Archie's <u>Burger</u> Pit.

Beniamino "Benny" <u>Bufano</u> was commissioned to create several large sculptures for the mall. Bufano had his <u>studio</u> on site and visitors were able to watch him create <u>statues</u> of animals.

The shopping center hosted many events. An automobile show displayed vintage and modern cars. On Father's Day, local children performed a musical show. In the fall, garden clubs from all over the county hosted a flower and fashion show. The mall also hosted events like holiday celebrations with live reindeer.


Scoring Rules

Strike: Mark with X, if you knock down all 10 pins on the first shot of a frame. 10 points, plus the sum of your next two shots.


Spare: Mark with a /, if you knock down all 10 pins on the second shot of a frame. 10 points, plus the number of pins you knock down on the next shot.






